


2. Now add the sides and secure them with glue.


3. Cover it all with modeling clay.

4. Place a sausage inside to round off the corners. Also add two sausages for the armrests and smooth all the joins.



1. Use the patterns on p. 33 to cut out the pieces of the sofa from stiff card. Fold the seat along the dotted lines and then stick on the back with

double-sided sticky tape and glue.



6. Decorate the cushions with paint (you will find examples of techniques and prints on p. 5).




## Armchair

You can make an armchair to match by following the same steps, with the help of the corresponding patterns on page 33. Why not make the whole suite?



5. Make a sheet and cut out some cushions the right size for your sofa. Round off the edges.

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1. Model a cone without a tip (see p. 4). Use the pattern on p. 34 to cut out a fabric remnant (the pattern serves as a reference that you will have to adapt to the size of the cone you have made). Cover the cone, embedding the edge of the fabric into the modeling clay with a tool.


2. Join the ends of the fabric together with a little glue.

3. Cut a modeling clay ball in half to use as a base. Paint a piece of skewer the same color and stick the cone onto the base.





3. Turn it over again and create a texture similar to that of a shaggy carpet. Do so by sticking in a skewer and then lifting up some modeling clay outwards.



A variety of shapes

You can also make floor mats in any shape you can think of, simply by cutting them out from a sheet of modeling clay.

1. Model many different colored sausages the same thickness. Join them together and make a spiral pressing down.


2. When you have obtained the size you want your floor mat to be, turn it over and join the sausages together so that they don't come apart.







Cot



1. Wrap a little ball in plastic and cover it with a thick layer of modeling clay slightly higher than half way. Smooth out the surface and carefully remove the plastic.

3. Stick two thick strips onto the base so that it can be rocked. Now make a modeling clay mattress, flat at the top and curved like the cot at the bottom. Put your baby to bed, cover it with a piece of fabric and rock it...

1. Model an oval and mark the baby's legs with a paintbrush handle. Each arm is a sausage with a little ball at the end.

2. Make the head round and stick on a little ball for the nose and half a flattened ball for each ear. Simulate the hair by tracing lines with a toothpick and the closed eyes with a straw. The pacifier is made from a flattened ball and a little sausage.

3. Give the hair and cheeks some color by applying some chalk with a paintbrush. Stick the head onto the body with a piece of toothpick. Bend the ends of the legs to form the feet.

Can you think of how to make some simple toys for your baby? For example, a rattle from a sausage and a ball.
